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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Directors of Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statement of financial position as of December 31, 2024, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff as of December 31, 2024, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and Government Auditing Standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or
 error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include
 examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are
 appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of
 the [Name of Nonprofit Organization] 's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting
 estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards, as required by Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the schedule of expenditures of federal awards is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated July 7, 2025, on our consideration of the Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

Nature of Activities:

Boys & Girls Club of Poplar Bluff, doing business as Boys & Girls Club of the Heartland, (the Organization) is a Missouri nonprofit corporation organized October 28, 1998, that promotes the heath, social, educational, vocational, and character development of boys and girls. The Organization is funded by grants from Boys & Girls Clubs of America, Poplar Bluff Public Schools, and other contributors.

Basis of Accounting:

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

Cash Equivalents:

Cash equivalents consist of short-term, highly liquid investments which are readily convertible into cash within ninety (90) days of purchase.

Accounts Receivable:

Government funding receivable is stated at the amount management expects to collect from outstanding balances. Uncollectible balances are considered immaterial.

Membership dues receivable is shown net of an allowance for uncollectibles. There were no changes to this allowance in 2024.

Promises to Give:

Contributions are recognized when the donor makes a promise to give to the Organization that is, in substance, unconditional. Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions if the restrictions expire in the fiscal year in which the contributions are recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions depending on the nature of the restrictions. When a restriction expires, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions.

Property and Equipment:

The Organization capitalizes property and equipment with a cost greater than \$1,000 and a useful life of one year or more, and all costs associated with a new construction or renovation project. Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost. Depreciation has been provided for over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets on the straight-line method ranging from 3 to 40 years.

Estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Income Taxes:

The organization is exempt from federal incomes taxes under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and therefore has made no provision for federal income taxes in the accompanying financial statements. There was no unrelated business income for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Revenue Recognition and Contributed Support:

The Organization follows the provisions of FASB ASU 2014-09, Revenue Recognition from Contracts with Customers (Topic 606) effective July 1, 2020.

The primary source of revenue is derived from government funding which is recognized as reimbursement is requested. Membership dues are recognized over the period the activity is provided.

The Organization also followed the provisions of FASB ASU 2018-08, *Clarifying the Scope and the Accounting Guidance for Contributions Received and Contributions Made (Topic 958)*. Contributions, including unconditional promises to give, are classified as support with donor restrictions if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets.

Cost Allocation:

The financial statements report certain categories of expenses that are attributable to more that one program or supporting function. Therefore, these expenses require allocation on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied. The expenses that are allocated include compensation, benefits and depreciation.

Compensated Absences:

The Organization has not accrued compensated absences because the amount cannot be reasonably estimated.

NOTE 4. GIFTS-IN-KIND:

The Organization records in-kind contributions of tangible property when received. These contributions are recognized at fair value at the date of the donation. During 2024, no gifts in-kind were received.

NOTE 5. PENSION PLAN:

The Organization contributes to a Simple IRA plan for employees who have met the service requirement of \$5,000 in earnings in the current and preceding year. Eligible employees may make a salary reduction election, and the Organization contributes a matching amount up to 3% of the employee's compensation for the year.

NOTE 6. INVESTMENTS:

NOTE 7. OTHER ASSETS:

The Blue Door Endowment was created to serve as an additional revenue stream that may be used at the Board of Director's discretion. Only 4% of the interest may be withdrawn per year but will only be drawn if there is a compelling need.

NOTE 9. CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK:

Cash and Investments

The Organization maintains cash accounts at several banks. Cash accounts at each bank are insured by the FDIC up to \$250,000. At times during the year, the cash balances exceeded insured amounts. At December 31, 2024, the Organization has investments with the Community Foundation of the Ozarks \$121,447 which was unsecured. The organization has not experienced any losses in such accounts nor does management believe there is any significant credit risk on cash or investments.

Funding

The Organization is supported primarily through government grants, donor contributions and fundraisers. The Organization depends heavily on grants and contributions for its revenue. The ability of the Organization's grantors and contributors to continue making grants comparable to the present level depends on many factors, including current and economic conditions. While the Organization's board of directors believes it has the resources to continue its programs, it's ability to do so and the extent to which it continues may be dependent upon the above factors.

NOTE 10. COMMITMENT:

The Organization started a capital campaign in 2022 to build a new 40,000-square-foot Workforce Development Regional Teen Center. This project will be funded with contributions and state grants. A \$250,000 NAP grant was awarded December 28, 2023 to help with this project and has since been amended to a \$584,290 grant.

NOTE 11. LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY OF FINANCIAL ASSETS:

The following reflects the Organization's financial assets of December 31, 2024, reduced by amounts not available for general use because of either contractual or donor-imposed restrictions within one year of the balance sheet date. See Note 7 for information on the board designated endowment.

NOTE 12. IRREVOCABLE STANDBY LETTER OF CREDIT:

The Organization entered in an agreement with Sterling Bank on August 19, 2024 to obtain a standby letter of credit for \$2,100,000 for the Regional Workforce Development Teen Center. This letter of credit matures December 19, 2026. Nothing was drawn on this loan in 2024.

NOTE 13. ACCRUED CONTINGENCY:

The Organization has not maintained necessary amounts of cash to comply with donor-imposed restrictions. At December 31, 2024, club operations owes the capital campaign \$346,202.

NOTE 14. DATE OF MANAGEMENT REVIEW:

Subsequent events have been evaluated through July 7, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States the financial statements of Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statement of financial position as of December 31, 2024, and the related statements of activities, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated July 7, 2025.

Report on Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements, on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that were not identified. We identified a certain deficiency in internal control, described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as item 2024-1 that we consider to be a material weakness.

Report on Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the financial statements. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no

instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Purpose of This Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the organization's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the organization's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether material noncompliance with the compliance requirements referred to above occurred, whether due to fraud or error, and express an opinion on Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff's compliance based on our audit. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, *Government Auditing Standards*, and the Uniform Guidance will always detect material noncompliance when it exists. The risk of not detecting material noncompliance resulting from fraud is higher than for that resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Noncompliance with the compliance requirements referred to above is considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, it would

influence the judgment made by a reasonable user of the report on compliance about Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff's compliance with the requirements of each major federal program as a whole.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, Government Auditing Standards, and the Uniform Guidance, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material noncompliance, whether due to fraud or error, and design and
 perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis,
 evidence regarding Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff's compliance with the compliance requirements
 referred to above and performing such other procedures as we considered necessary in the
 circumstances.
- Obtain an understanding of Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff's internal control over compliance
 relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances and to
 test and report on internal control over compliance in accordance with the Uniform Guidance, but not for
 the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff's
 internal control over compliance. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and any significant deficiencies and material weaknesses in internal control over compliance that we identified during the audit.

Report on Internal Control over Compliance

A deficiency in internal control over compliance exists when the design or operation of a control over compliance does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program on a timely basis. A material weakness in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance requirement of a federal program will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A significant deficiency in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program that is less severe than a material weakness in internal control over compliance, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control over compliance was for the limited purpose described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of Compliance section above and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over compliance that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies in internal control over compliance. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over compliance that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above. However, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies in internal control over compliance may exist that were not identified.

Our audit was not designed for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control over compliance. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.

The purpose of this report on internal control over compliance is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over compliance and the results of that testing based on the requirements of the Uniform Guidance. Accordingly, this report is not suitable for any other purpose.

NOTE 1 - BASIS OF PRESENTATION

The accompanying Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards includes federal grant activity of the Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff under programs of the federal government for the year ended December 31, 2024. The information in this schedule is presented in accordance with the requirements of the Office of Management and Budget's (OMB's) *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audits Requirements for Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance)* located in 2 CFR part 200. Because the schedule presents only a selected portion of the operations of the Boys & Girls Club of Poplar Bluff, it is not intended to and does not present the financial position, changes in net assets or cash flows of the Boys & Girls Club of Poplar Bluff.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards is prepared on the same basis of accounting as the organization's financial statements. The organization uses the accrual basis of accounting. Expenditures represent only federally funded portions of the program.

NOTE 3—INDIRECT COST RATE

The Boys & Girls Club of Poplar Bluff has elected not to use the 15% de minimis indirect cost rate allowed under the Uniform Guidance.

SUMMARY OF AUDIT RESULTS

- 1. The auditor's report expresses an unmodified opinion on the financial statements of the Boys and Girls Club Poplar Bluff.
- 2. One deficiency were reported in the Report on Internal Control Over Financial Reporting and on Compliance and Other Matters Based on an Audit of Financial Statements Performed in Accordance With *Government Auditing Standards*.
- 3. No instances of noncompliance material to the financial statements of the Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff, which would be required to be reported in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, were disclosed during the audit.
- 4. No reportable conditions were disclosed during the audit of the major federal award program.
- 5. The auditor's report on compliance for the major federal award program for the Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff, expresses an unmodified opinion on all major programs.
- 6. There are no audit findings that are required to be reported in accordance with 2 CFR section 200.516(a) reported in this Schedule.
- 7. The program tested as major program: U. S. Department of Education, 21st Century Community Learning Centers Program, Assistance Listing No. 84.287c.
- 8. The threshold used for distinguishing between Type A and B programs was \$750,000.
- 9. The Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff qualified to be a low-risk auditee.

FINDINGS-FINANCIAL STATEMENT AUDIT

2024-001 Amount Due to Capital Campaign

Condition:

Some grants and donations that were meant for the capital campaign were deposited into the operating account and spent for operations resulting in \$346,202 needing to be transferred to the capital campaign cash account.

Criteria:

All capital campaign funds received should be deposited into separate bank accounts and only spent for intended purposes.

BOYS & GIRLS CLUB OF POPLAR BLUFF SCHEDULE OF FINDINGS AND QUESTIONED COSTS DECEMBER 31, 2024

Cause:

Oversight. The Club did not intentionally spend capital campaign funds on operations, but by being in the same bank account, inadvertently used capital campaign funds.

Recommendation:

We recommend that operations repay the capital campaign as soon as possible.

Views of Responsible Officials and Planned Corrective Actions:

The Boys and Girls Club of Poplar Bluff agrees with the finding and is in the process of repaying the capital campaign. The finance committee evaluates the repayment strategy on a monthly basis in an effort to repay as soon as possible.
